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Book Review

Sleisenger, M. H., and Fordtran, J. S.: Gastrointestinal Disease: Pathophysiology—Diagnosis—Management. Philadelphia, W. B. Saunders, 1973. Pp. 1,659. \$37.50.

This newest textbook of gastroenterology must certainly be rated as a superb effort. Its authors have been selected from the best known and respected authorities in the field and its organization is outstanding. The basics of gastrointestinal physiology are well covered, but practical clinical considerations are not neglected and the bibliographies are recent and

complete. Pediatric gastroenterology is well covered and there is extensive treatment of functional as well as organic disease. It is a volume suitable for any individual interested in a comprehensive treatment of gastrointestinal disease, from medical student to subspecialist.

The prospective purchaser should, however, be aware that hepatic disease is not covered in this text, as it was the authors' purpose to devote their efforts entirely to the gut itself. If one accepts this limitation, the volume will be a valuable and relatively inexpensive addition to any library.—RICHARD E. SEDLACK, M.D.
