

This study (https://doi.org/10.1245/s10434-023-14034-w) investigated the quality of life and values of patients with cancer who underwent CRS  $\pm$  HIPEC. Despite long-term

impairments, quality of life improved over time and is similar to other surgery survivors. Survivors prioritized longevity and independence over experience and cost.
