## **JONSMOD 2010**

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The papers in this issue arise from those presented at the 15th biennial Joint Numerical Sea Modelling Group (JONSMOD) conference that was held in the beautiful old city of Delft in the Netherlands, from 10th to 12th May 2010.

The JONSMOD community is a group of about 100 researchers interested in modelling shallow sea dynamics. More details about the history of JONSMOD can be found in the 2007 issue of *Ocean Dynamics* (volume 57, issues 4 and 5). About 95 scientists participated in the Delft meeting, mostly from (11) European countries, while several researchers joined from overseas: USA, Canada, New Zealand and Singapore. A record number of 70(!) scientific papers were presented. Perhaps a pointer for the future, 20% of the participants was female. The interest in the meeting and subsequent large number of presentations made us decide to organise two parallel sessions during the second of the 3 days, which was a novelty for JONSMOD.
