IDENBURG, A.W.F. (1861–1935)

Dutch Minister for the Colonies 1902–05, 1908 and 1918–19. Governor-General of East Indies 1909–16.

The Algemeen Rijksarchief, The Hague, has a small collection of papers (0.1m) covering the period 1915–34. It includes letters to van Heutz (1905–09) and Pleyte (1913–15) (Inventory 2.21.183: Coll. 359). Other papers can be found in the Middleburg family archive (Inventory 2.21.183: Coll. 295). The Abraham Kuyperstichting, Free University, Amsterdam has an extensive collection of Idenburg papers.

IDMAN, Karl Gustaf (1885–1961)

Finnish politician and diplomat.

There is a small collection of Idman's correspondence with Finnish Foreign Ministers and diplomats at the *Valtionsarkisto*, Helsinki. The archive consists of one box.

IMRÉDY, Béla (1891–1946)

Hungarian Finance Minister in the Gombos Ministry 1932–35 and later Prime Minister between May 1938 and February 1939. Also acted as Foreign Minister for a short period between November and December 1938. A supporter of German foreign policy, he was forced to resign the premiership on account of his Jewish ancestry. Later formed the Hungarian Revival Party and acted as Minister for Economic Affairs during the German occupation. After the liberation, he was sentenced to death and executed.

The Hungarian National Archives, Budapest, have a collection of papers (3.22m) which cover the period 1932–39.

INGMAN, Lauri Johannes (1868–1934)

Finnish Archbishop and Prime Minister 1918-19 and 1924-26.

The Valtionsarkisto, Helsinki, has an extensive collection of documents comprising seventyseven boxes. These include correspondence from the years 1887–1934 as well as notes and drafts of parliamentary documents. There are also documents and papers on his political career as well as material on church matters and his university career. Access to the collection is restricted.

IRIMESCU, Radu (fl. 1930s)

Romanian politician and diplomat. Minister of Air and Navy 1932–38. Ambassador to the United States 1938–40.

A collection of papers, covering the period 1918–40, is in the Hoover Institution, Stanford University, California. The papers (in Romanian) include correspondence, reports, and despatches on Romanian domestic politics and foreign policy.

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
