Its viewpoint is completely enlightened. For instance, the first issue includes an article by Professor Carney Landis of Columbia University and the New York State Psychiatric Institute. This article is exceedingly critical of current Protestant theology.

The issue as a whole is an attempt to co-ordinate religion and psychiatry—with the aim of teaching the theologian what the psychiatrist has so painfully learned. Its articles are sound and the endeavor is one which medical psychotherapists can commend without reservation.
