DR. WESLEY BOURNE HONOURED AT McGILL

At the Spring Convocation of McGill University, Chancellor B. C. Gardner conferred the title of "Professor Emeritus" on Doctor Wesley Bourne. Doctor Bourne commenced his pioneer work in the completely new specialty of Anaesthesia back in 1912. In recognition of his teaching ability, he was appointed the first Professor of Anaesthesia at McGill University in 1942, a position which he held with honor and distinction for a period of ten years.

Doctor Bourne's many friends across Canada will be happy to learn of this honor, which he so richly deserves.

Doctor Karl E. Hollis, former Superintendent of Sunnybrook Hospital, has been appointed representative of The Canadian Commission on Hospital Accreditation. Doctor Hollis was for many years a member of The Anaesthetic Staff of the Toronto Western Hospital and was Head of that Department for some time prior to his enlistment in the R.C.A.M.C. in World War II. He held the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel and was Commanding Officer of Chorley Park Military Hospital and later the hospital ship "Lady Nelson". Following his demobilization, he was appointed Superintendent of Sunnybrook Hospital, Toronto, a position which he held until the time of his retirement last year.
