THE INTERNATIONAL OSTEOPOROSIS FOUNDATION (IOF)

The International Osteoporosis Foundation (IOF) is the only worldwide organization dedicated to the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of osteoporosis and musculoskeletal diseases. It is a Swiss not-for-profit Foundation acting as an umbrella organization bringing together all stakeholders; including, scientists, physicians, patient and medical societies as well as corporate partners interested in osteoporosis, osteoarthritis and bone health.

IOF has three membership committees including the Committee of National Societies (CNS) representing 214 member societies in 96 countries or regions, the Committee of Scientific Advisors (CSA) represented by 222 thought leaders from around the world and the Committee of Corporate Advisors (CCA), comprised of 29 companies interested in bone health. In addition, with a new individual membership option, IOF is also extending its outreach to the general public and health professionals around the world.

IOF organizes its operations from its headquarters in Nyon, Switzerland, as well as regional offices in Buenos Aires, Dubai and Singapore. It mobilizes the global osteoporosis movement on World Osteoporosis Day October 20, every year. Part of the IOF's mission is to support and enhance the work of its member societies which is reflected in many programmes and projects, including the IOF World Wide Conference of Osteoporosis Patient Societies, held every two years.

IOF holds the annual IOF-ESCEO World Congress on Osteoporosis, Osteoarthritis and Musculoskeletal Diseases as well as regional scientific meetings, often in partnership with other organizations. These include the IOF Regionals in the Asia-Pacific, Latin America and the Middle East & Africa regions. IOF organizes training courses around the world including the flagship course, IOF Advanced Training Course on Osteoporosis in Geneva, Switzerland, and the IOF ISCD international course Osteoporosis: Essentials of Densitometry, Diagnostic and Management.

IOF's scientific publication portfolio includes the journals *Osteoporosis International, Calcified Tissue International and Musculoskeletal Research, Archives of Osteoporosis,* and *Progress in Osteoporosis,* the latter being a free access online review journal which is available at *www.iofbonehealth.org/pio.*

IOF REGIONALIZATION PROGRAMME

IOF has a strong regional programme which enhances collaboration among the member associations at the regional level. The programme helps IOF to better serve specific local needs and contributes to the dynamic growth of IOF and the strengthening of osteoporosis associations worldwide.

'IOF Regionals', IOF's regular regional scientific events, are an essential element of the programme. These meetings help to raise standards of osteoporosis education in the regions and provide an international high-profile forum for regional research. high quality international clinical meetings 'close to home'. Another important element is the election of Regional Advisory Councils (RAC) from among the full member societies in the regions.

REGIONAL EPIDEMIOLOGICAL AUDITS – ASIA-PACIFIC AUDIT 2013

IOF has published several landmark reports including the 'Asian Audit – Epidemiology, costs and burden of osteoporosis in Asia 2009', the 'Eastern Europe & Central Asia Regional Audit' (2010), the 'Middle East & Africa Regional Audit', and the 'Latin America Audit' (2012).

As an update to the 2009 Asian Audit, the Asia-Pacific Audit is to be launched at the IOF Regionals 4th Asia-Pacific Osteoporosis Meeting in Hong Kong on December 12, 2013. In addition to the original 14 countries included in the 2009 Asian Audit, the 2013 update also includes Australia and New Zealand. In collaboration with the national societies, and verified from the recent literature, the update will report on current epidemiological trends in osteoporosis in each of the featured countries. This is the first update in a series of Audits published by IOF which serve to gain media attention and energize research and policy work in the regions.

ABOUT THE CO-ORGANIZERS

HONG KONG OSTEOPOROSIS FOUNDATION

The Hong Kong Osteoporosis Foundation (HKOF) has been established by a group of medical and health care workers and community leaders to combat osteoporosis. It is a charitable organization registered in Hong Kong.

The Foundation carries the missions to promote knowledge and awareness of osteoporosis among citizens in Hong Kong; to research, propagate and support primary prevention programmes and evidence-based strategies for osteoporosis and to support policies for improving the health of patients with osteoporosis.

Strategic activities include:

- 1. Organize health exhibition and other health education activities for the public
- 2. Organize training courses, scientific symposia and congresses for the medical and health professionals
- 3. Promote research
- 4. Propagate and support preventive and treatment programmes for osteoporosis
- 5. Establish and support patient support groups

OSTEOPOROSIS SOCIETY OF HONG KONG (OSHK)

The Osteoporosis Society of Hong Kong (OSHK) was founded in 2002 by specialists with multidisciplinary representation including physicians, gynecologists, orthopaedic surgeons and nuclear medicine specialists with Prof Annie Kung as the Founding President. With over 300 active members ranging from clinicians, scientists, technologists and allied health professionals, the major objective of OSHK is to promote professional education on osteoporosis.

In terms of professional education, OSHK organizes an annual Regional Osteoporosis Conference (ROC) in May each year. It also organizes densitometry training courses once every 2-3 years. This year the first Joint ISCD and IOF International Densitometry Course in Asia was held before the ROC on 24-25 May 2013. The Society also regularly organizes scientific seminars and meetings, the A-Z symposia series being a highlight every October in line with World Osteoporosis Day.

To support training and research, OSHK provides support to members to attend osteoporosis-related conferences and courses. The OSHK Guideline for Clinical Management of Postmenopausal Osteoporosis in Hong Kong was published as a supplement in the April issue of the Hong Kong Medical Journal. With this new set of guidelines published, it serves as a reference guide for the local practitioners in the management of postmenopausal osteoporosis.

The Society is also very active in public education, with regular contributions to media including newspaper columns, TVB, RTHK and the NOW health programs.

FLOUR DOLL MAKING

The tools used in making flour dolls are simple indeed: a pair of scissors, an ordinary hair comb, and bamboo sticks. Artificial colourings are added to turn plain flour dough into colourful dough. By rolling and twisting the various lumps of flour together in the palm of the craftsmen's hands, extraordinary and interesting characters are created, like fish, birds, pigs or even little persons.

RAINBOW CALLIGRAPHY

Instead of using traditional brush made of animals' hair, Chinese Rainbow Calligraphers use a specially made wooden or rubber pen. It came to be called Rainbow Calligraphy because each character is made up of colourful strokes and is decorated with different symbols and each symbol carries a special meaning, e.g. dragon – power, butterfly – beauty, a phoenix – nobility.

CHINESE KNOTTING

Traditional Chinese decorative knots, also known as Chinese knots, are typical local arts of China. They are a distinctive and traditional Chinese folk handicraft woven separately from one piece of thread and named according to its shape and meaning.
