Thomson-Reuters recently released the 2009 Impact Factors. The Impact Factor is one tool for ranking, classifying, evaluating and comparing journals. The Impact Factor is a measure of the frequency with which the average article in a journal has been cited in a year or period of time. We are very pleased to report the journal's 2009 Impact Factor has increased significantly to 0.800. The current impact factor is the highest in the 2005–2009 timeframe. *Sexuality and Disability* is ranked 31 of 52 journals (3rd quartile) in its category, Rehabilitation. Several factors provide the academic foundation and prestige of a journal. As Editor, I want to personally thank the readership, authors, referees and reviewers, and the Editorial Board.
