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Although we continue to move toward a value-based healthcare system, our ability to weigh the importance of various value metrics is lacking. In this exploratory cross-sectional survey study (<https://doi.org/10.1245/s10434-022-11534-z>), we compared perceptions of value

between cancer patients and providers. These data demonstrate the importance of accounting for multistakeholder perspectives in assessments of value in health care.
