

**THE NATIONAL CONFERENCE ON THE USE OF ON-LINE COMPUTERS IN  
PSYCHOLOGY ANNOUNCES THE SECOND ANNUAL STUDENT PAPER COMPETITION**

Papers may be submitted across a broad range of computer-related topics, including, but not limited to: (a) innovative programming for on-line research, for simulation models, or for statistical procedures; (b) innovative hardware design for computer configurations, for peripheral devices, or for interface and communication networks; (c) applications of computers to psychology in new experimental paradigms, stimulus generation, or response collection procedures. Papers may be theoretical, experimental, and/or applied in approach. Eligibility is limited to (a) work done by a student currently enrolled in courses or (b) work done as a part of course, thesis, or other student research by a person who graduated within the year preceding the 1979 Conference. The author of the winning paper will be invited to address the 1979 Conference and will receive a complimentary year's membership in the Conference, a complimentary 1-year subscription to *Behavior Research Methods & Instrumentation*, and a \$50 cash prize.

DEADLINE: AUGUST 1, 1979

Authors must submit six copies of the full paper. A cover sheet should include the author's name, mailing address, telephone number, academic affiliation, a 50-word abstract, and a self-addressed stamped postcard and envelope.
