Victoria Bates argues that ideas about crime, consent, and the female body can be better understood by examining what happens in courtrooms when cases of sexual assault are being tried. Crucially, these legal cases also provide a new way of seeing how people in Victorian and Edwardian England understood the shifting boundaries between childhood and adulthood. Medical witnesses in courtrooms increasingly wielded immense influence on the outcomes of trials as well as affecting popular beliefs and attitudes towards sexual crimes and the status of children. Drawing on a formidable range of primary sources, including detailed case studies of legal sessions in the courts of Middlesex and the South West, Bates reflects on sexual crime as a social problem. In common with all volumes in the 'Genders and Sexualities in History' series, Sexual Forensics in Victorian and Edwardian England is a sophisticated contribution to our understanding of the past. It is an absorbing read.


