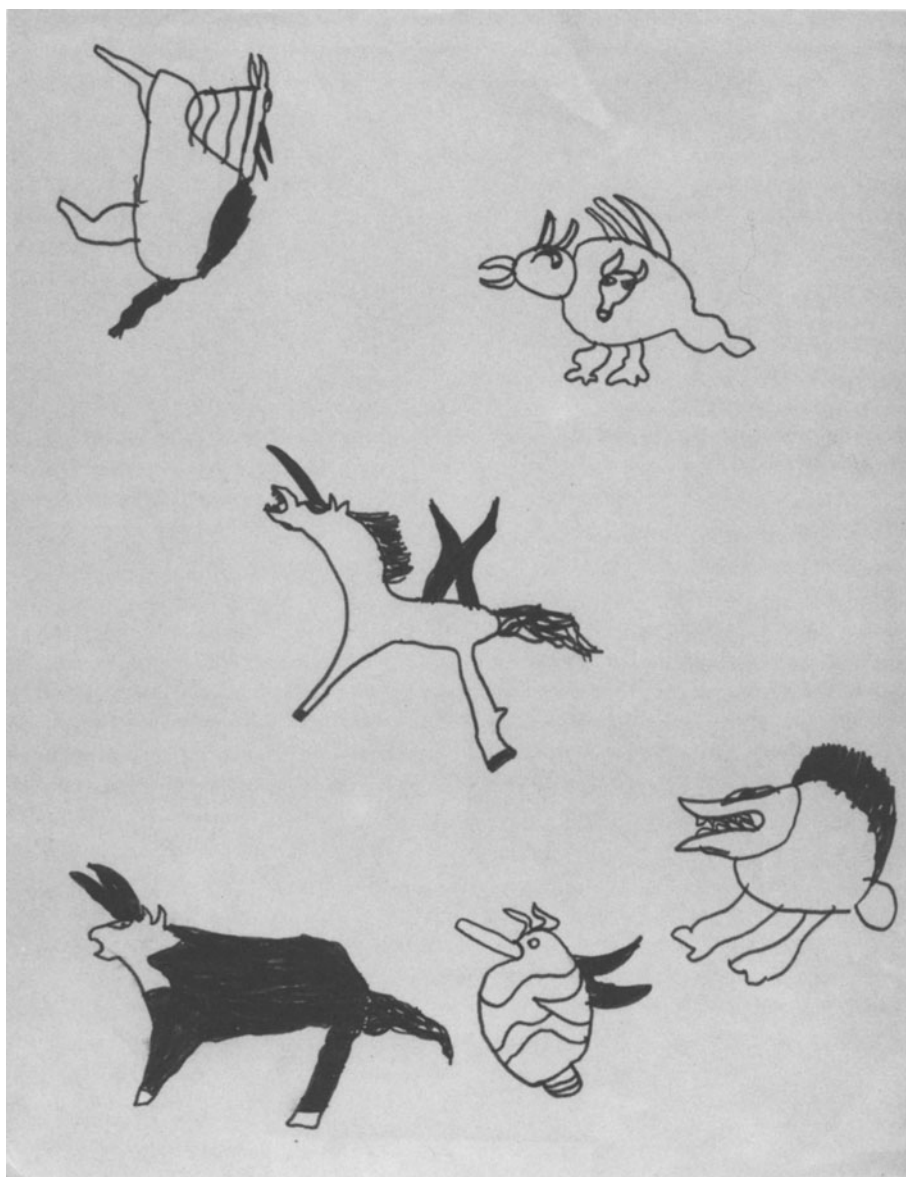

Appendix



A well-constructed annotated bibliography is an extremely useful source of information. In the editors' many years of work in day treatment, we often sought information about an aspect of day treatment, such as program evaluation, administrative organization, population descriptions, or treatment methods. On several occasions, we found much information and were grateful. On other occasions, we found very little and wrote a review article or designed a system ourselves. Much of the difficulty in finding articles on day psychiatric treatment was due to poor indexing, and searches often required entry into a variety of different data bases. We were eventually surprised to find as many references as we did. Of the 157 references uncovered, 38% were research papers, 50% were descriptions of programs, and 12% dealt with administration issues. In the process of reviewing this large number of articles, Sara Zimet came to the conclusion that an annotated bibliography would serve as an aid to dissemination of information about various aspects of day psychiatric treatment for children. It is offered here as an appendix.
